

2024 season

After putting together a strong regular season, the Patriots came up 14 strokes short of advancing to the regional meet, despite Caleb DeRome shooting a 70 to become the first sectional medalist in school history. JCHS finished the season with an 11-2 record, only suffering losses to Delta and South Adams. The Patriots slipped to third in the Allen County Athletic Conference Tournament behind South Adams and Adams Central.

Fast facts

•Caleb DeRome became the first Patriot to earn sectional medalist honors after shooting an even 70 at Hickory Hills Golf Course last season.

•This will be Jay Houck's first season at the helm of Jay County. The 2017 JCHS graduate - he golfed all four years in high school - will keep former coach Dave Haines on as an assistant this year.

•The Patriots' last regional appearance as a team came in 2022. They finished in 18th place with 377 strokes, 20 behind the 17th-placed Northeastern Knights.

•Only two golfers with varsity experience return for JCHS, as three graduated and one chose not to return.

Saturday, April 26, at South Adams

South Adams took away the Patriots chance at an ACAC title, as they bested the Patriots in both the regular season and tournament. This will provide an opportunity at some revenge.

Saturday, May 24, at ACAC Tournament

The ACAC Tournament is first goal the Patriots golf for, deciding the conference champion. It is also the only 18-hole match close to the sectional match in early June, providing the opportunity for a final tune up.

2025 Baseball

2024 season

The Patriots had an up-and-down season last year, leading to a 13-12 record. After starting the season on a five-game losing streak, Jay County strung together six straight victories to swing its record back above .500. JCHS finished third in the Allen County Athletic Conference with a 4-2 record, just one game behind co-champions Heritage and Bluffton. The Patriots fell to the New Castle Trojans 13-12 in an eight-inning sectional semifinal game to end the season.

Coach Todd Farr says

"We've been kind of taking a different approach to the season. Going into those last two seasons injury prone, we weren't able to get into a lot of my philosophy with baseball and this year, it's hit full force and they're getting into it. They're buying into it. They're a fun team to be around. They're a group of kids that I can get on them and they're not going to hang their heads. They're going to move on to the next pitch and sometimes that's really hard to get across to young guys. They're getting after it and they play extremely hard. That's what I love about them and they give me effort every day. ... This is a whole new stress and a fun stress this year. Now I have to find out who can play and put them in the right spot so they can be successful and win ball games. Not saying this to be cocky, but I truly believe this group can win baseball games and they're confident about their ability. They're relentless. The one thing we're hammering is, doesn't matter if we're down, we're going to keep coming at you. They're not going to quit and we're just ready to get after it."

- •Jay County last won a sectional in 2019 before falling in the regional final to Yorktown.
- •The Patriots have fallen to New Castle in the past three sectional tournaments.
- •This will be Todd Farr's third season at the helm of the Patriots. Over the first two seasons, Farr has built a 26-26 record and has gone 5-7 in the ACAC.



2024 season

With Isaac Kunkler graduating at the end of 2023, the Patriots slid back a spot in both the Allen County Athletic Conference and the sectional to finish fourth in the former and sixth in the latter. Adam Alig had the strongest season for JCHS, reaching the regional in the high jump and claimed a conference title in the 110-meter hurdles. Alig failed to clear the bar in the regional. The only other ACAC title came from the 4x100 relay team of Oskar Alart Mateo, Caden Gambill, Peyton Yowell and Garett Hidy. Austyn LeMaster came one spot short of a trip to the regional, throwing his discus 123 feet, 4 inches to take fourth.


Fast facts

The Patriots and Woodlan have finished first and second in the previous two Allen County Athletic Conference Tournaments. This late-season meet will give both teams the opportunity to get a read on each other's rosters and how they can design a lineup to maximize points.

Friday, May 9, at ACAC Tournament

The ACAC Tournament acts as a measure of growth from the regular season, and works as a final tune-up to make tweaks before entering the postseason.

•Gabi Bilbrey was the last Patriot to make the state meet in 2023. She placed 13th in the discus with a throw of 122 feet, 5 inches.

•Jay County last won a sectional title in 2019 with a score of 129 to beat the field at Delta.

•The JCHS 4x100 meter relay team set the school record in 2024. Matilda Mende, Jenna Dues, Morgan DeHoff and Moa Skamoto combined to run a 50.87 second time to break the 25-year record.

2024 season

The Patriots found strength in numbers last year as six regional qualifications and five Allen County Athletic Conference titles pushed JCHS one spot higher in both the sectional and conference tournaments. Morgan DeHoff (100-meter hurdles), Jenna Dues (200 dash), Jordyn Hutzler (shot put) and Cash Hollowell (300 hurdles) along with the 4x100 and 4x400 relay teams advanced to the regional to help Jay County to third in the sectional. Both relay teams topped the competition at the conference meet, while the 4x100 relay squad set a new school record as well. Other ACAC titles belonged to Matilda Mende (100 dash), Jenna Dues (200 dash) and Mya Kunkler (high jump).

2024 season

Jay County put together a strong 2024 campaign to earn a 16-7 record and make it back to the sectional final for the first time since 2010. The Patriots opened the season with four straight wins before hitting a slight skid and responding with an eight-game winning streak. They hit one final hiccup in the regular season before rolling through the first two rounds of the sectional. They eventually fell 4-2 to Yorktown. The Patriots tied for second with Woodlan in the ACAC at 4-2. The two losses came to champion South Adams and Adams Central.

Games to watch Saturday, April 12, at Fort Recovery

The Patriots and Indians missed out on the 2024 clash due to weather. The series with the team to the east will be revived early this season.

Tuesday, May 6, at South Adams

The Starfires went undefeated in the ACAC in 2024, and beat the Patriots 3-1. South Adams will be the biggest hill for the Patriots to climb to move up in the conference.

Thursday, May 22, vs. Huntington North

Huntington North put together an 18-7 season and made its way to the regional. The Vikings will give the Patriots a late-season test to measure how ready they are for the sectional.

Coach Doug Arbuckle says

"Out of the 20 girls we've got here, we've got 10 freshmen. So, we're going to have to take some baby steps to get everybody gelling together and knowing each other and then we'll go from there. Hopefully we can be competitive in every ball game, that's a goal. I think once we figure it out, the lineup could be pretty solid 1-10 with no weaknesses. We've got a lot of returning offense. I think the big thing will be our two pitchers hitting their spots and missing barrels and then the defense playing good behind them not giving them extra outs. If we can do that, I think we'll be pretty successful this year."

Fast facts

•The Patriots have never won a sectional championship despite making the final six times since 1999.

•This will be Doug Arbuckle's third season since returning to the softball program in 2023. He previously coached the Patriots from 2009-15.

•The Patriots have never won the Allen County Athletic Conference during the 10 seasons of membership, but they tied for second place in the past four seasons.

•JCHS returns seven of nine starters as only its third baseman and center fielder graduated. The two departures made up 22.2% of runs scored and 23.4% of runs batted in.

2024 season

Jay County claimed its fourth consecutive sectional championship with a 4-1 victories over Randolph Southern in the opener and Union City in the final. The Patriots finished the season with a 9-6 record and 1-2 in the Allen County Athletic Conference with losses to Adams Central and South Adams. JCHS swept its sectional foes, beating Winchester and Union City during the regular season, while the match against Randolph Southern got cancelled.

Fast facts

 The Patriots have won four consecutive sectional titles, boasting their resume to nine total championships. They got swept in two of the regional openers, fell to Mississinawa 3-2 in 2023 and 4-1 to Marion in 2021.

•This will be Andrea Garringer's second season at the helm. Last year she led Jay County to a 9-6 (60%) record and 1-2 in the Allen County Athletic Conference.

•JCHS only returns three staples from last year's lineup while graduating two singles players and two doubles. In total, 61.3% of the matches played left.
