Rammel seeks to end career with another medal while Homan leads strong softball team

Rammel aims for medal, girls hope more make state

The Indians took a trio to state a year ago.

One of them stood on the podium.

The goal this year is to have a bigger group at the final meet of the season and get more medals.

Senior Whitley Rammel leads a contingent of three Fort Recovery High School track and field athletes who are coming off their first career state berths, and a strong group of

distance runners is primed to make the next step as the Indians get their 2022 season underway.

"With them being underclassmen last year ... they definitely plan on a return trip to state," FRHS coach Christy Diller said of sophomore Mara Pearson as well as seniors Abbie Francis and Rammel. "There's no reason not to expect that."

Rammel finished sixth in shot put in the Division III state meet reaching state in high jump.

at Westerville North. The district champion had set the school record of 41 feet, 1.25 inches, but was unable to best herself at state.

"She feels she can throw further," Diller said. "As she focuses more on fundamentals and really drilling down the specifics - she's looked good in practice this year. That is really exciting to see."

Rammel narrowly missed

and Diller thinks she's got a shot to qualify in two events this year.

"Definitely like to fix that," she said. "We've done a better job so far early on getting her more reps. It's just a matter of making sure we're splitting her time effectively."

Pearson made the finals in long jump but finished ninth and missed out on the podium. She was one of three freshmen to compete in the

event at the state meet.

"I think her confidence is much higher this year," Diller said. "She feels like she belongs there. She's ready to work. She's (been) excited about it since day one."

Francis was 16th in the 100meter dash in 12.87 seconds. Diller noted Francis is chasing the school records in the sprint events, and will also be part of the sprint relays.

Softball team loses key piece from 2021 season

The Indians had the pieces in place for a special 2021 season.

They had an opportunity to win the conference title for the first time in more than a decade, and played for a sectional championship for the third time in the previous 12 seasons.

While those goals came up a bit short, the Fort Recovery High School softball team enters the 2022 season with every piece but one, albeit a huge presence, to replace.

"Expectations haven't changed as far as ... we're still hoping to contend for the (Midwest Athletic Conference) again," said FRHS coach Ryan Thien, whose team was 17-10 (4-3 MAC) last

year and opens the season Monday at home against Ansonia. "Obviously we lost a key player in Brenna Homan. We have to fill her productions."

Homan, who now plays for University of Saint Francis, was the catcher and the leadoff hitter. She led the team in batting average (.543), hits (51), runs (53), walks (13), strikeouts (three) and stolen bases (35). She also set the MAC career record for stolen bases

Maddie Guggenbiller occasionally spelled Homan at catcher when she wasn't playing third base, so she can help fill that role.

Fort Recovery has had a strong distance group in recent years as the girls cross country team has placed 13th and 12th, respectively, in the state meet. Diller is hopeful, although they're young, that they can join the aforementioned trio at the state finals.

"I think the benefit this year is they have more confidence," Diller said. "Ellie (Will) and Jenna (Hart) had a great year in the 2-mile. Natalie (Brunswick) had an excellent 1-mile.

"Now they know what they're doing. They can compete with the big kids. They're really excited."

Freshman Anna Roessner is coming off a season during which she was the Midwest Athletic Conference champion in both the 100- and 400-meter dash races as well as the runner-up in the 200 dash. Diller expects the youngster to have an immediate impact for the team.

"We're excited to get her going on the relays," she



said. "The sprint relays had good success last year, so I'm excited we can reload missing (2021 graduate) Kierra Wendel. Feeling good we can plug Anna into those and she should have success pretty early on."

As for the Tribe boys, the 13-member team is without a senior. Sophomore Trevor Heitkamp, who qualified for state during the cross country season, is likely to be the top performer on the team.

"He has big goals," Diller said. "Coming in much fitter. That (cross country) experience is going to help him quite a bit. We're pretty thin on distance, so Trevor is going to be leading the way for points."

Diller noted the return of iunior Ross Pearson and sophomore Reece Guggenbiller as key sprinters, with Guggenbiller also handling the long jump. Sophomore Lucas Acheson is expected to participate in high jump and some sprint relays.

Because of such a

small team, Diller noted competing for a conference title will be a difficult task. The Indians were eighth last season.

Fort Recovery's girls were fifth in the MAC, with Minster completing the sweep.

"I think we have kids that can be competitive individually," Diller said of

But Thien said he has
been working with freshman Kylie Post as
Homan's full-time replacement.

"Caught all the ranks coming up," Thien said of Post. "She's got experience, just not varsity experience. She's actually, in the intersquad scrimmages, been exceeding my expectations."

Behind Homan in terms of batting average were Jackie Homan (.423), Chloey Grisez (.408) and Sophie Pearson (.326). Grisez will reprise her role at shortstop, while Pearson and Jackie Homan will split time between first base and pitcher.

Jackie Homan had a 2.97 ERA with 89 strikeouts and 10 walks in 113 innings, and Pearson came on later in the season to pitch in highstakes games. In 52 2/3 innings she struck out 51, walked 19 and ended with a 5.18 ERA.

"I think they know the other one is right there waiting to take that job, so that keeps them pushing each other to do bet-

At the plate, Jackie Homan led the Indians in doubles (19), RBIs (39), and home runs (five) last season. Pearson's five triples led the team, and she also finished with eight doubles, 26 RBIs and 21 runs.

Cali Wendel (.228 AVG, five doubles, 11 RBIs) will play second base, with Ava Schoen, Allison Knapke and Abby Knapke in line to return as starters in the outfield. Thien said Emma Will, Ella Schoen and Kayla Heitkamp can be in the outfield mix as well.

"We've got quite a bit of experience coming back," Thien said. "Hoping they can top what they did last

year or better what we did last year.

"Definitely think we're going to be pretty sound this year. Basically the same team back except the catcher, which is the huge piece."

Fort Recovery was seeded fifth in the district tournament last year and

fell in the sectional final to No. 3 seed Lincolnview. The Indians, who lost to the Lancers 4-3 during the regular season, were up 2-1 after the third inning but a five-run fourth dashed their title hopes.

Eyink takes over youthful baseball team

The Indians graduated their top two hitters.


Their two best pitchers are gone as well, one to graduation and another to an injury.

First-year Fort Recovery High School baseball coach Kevin Eyink will have his work cut out for him this year as the Tribe looks to move on from a 9-17 record and the loss of a half dozen seniors.

"We lose some good players there," said Eyink, who was named in September to succeed Jerry Kaup after spending nine seasons as an assistant. "I feel like we've got some good young players coming up here. We have a good group coming back."

Eyink mentioned his three seniors: first baseman Kendrik Wendel, third baseman/pitcher Brock Dues and catcher Marcus Gaerke.

Wendel batted .231 with three doubles, 10 runs and nine RBIs in 2021. Dues was third on the team with his .289 average at the plate while adding 13 runs, 12 RBIs and four doubles. On the mound, Dues had

a 4.15 ERA with 31 strikeouts and 10 walks in 25 1/3 innings.

Gaerke did not have varsity experience last season.

"Hopefully just some of that senior leadership," Eyink said when asked what he expects out of the trio. "Hopefully they can show that work ethic and be leaders that way and bring guys along with them."

Gone are Ryne Post and Cobe Wendel, who batted .351 and .303, respectively. Post was the team's shortstop, while Wendel played outfield.

Daniel Patch, who went 2-3 with a 1.83 ERA, led the squad in starts (eight), innings pitched (46) and strikeouts (70) as a sophomore. But an elbow injury will keep him from playing this year.

"That's a big person to (not) have out there," Eyink said. Dillan Evers, who was

Dillan Evers, who was second with 36 1/3 innings as a senior, went 4-2 with a 1.93 ERA, 33 strikeouts and 15 walks.

Eyink said juniors Jackson Ervin, Bo Thien and Wyatt Bihn will join Dues in the rotation.

"Jackson, Wyatt, those guys have got to step up as pitchers this year," Eyink said. "They don't have a ton of varsity experience yet but they're looking good. I'm hoping they get a good start out of the gates and bring the pitching staff along."

Sophomore Troy Homan

will also be pitching when he's not anchoring the outfield in center. Homan had a team-high 11 appearances on the mound last year, and his 1.41 ERA was the Tribe's lowest. He struck out 24 and walked nine in 24 2/3 innings while finishing 1-3 and recording the team's only save.

Two days later, the Indians had a makeup game with the Minster Wildcats to settle the conference standings. A win would have made a three-way tie for first, giving the Indians their first MAC championship since 2005. But the Wildcats shut out the Tribe 10-0 in six innings to end the Tribe's season

After Monday's season opener, Fort Recovery hosts South Adams and meets Mississinawa Valley on April 1. The Tribe has home MAC games against Parkway (April 12), Marion Local (April 19), Coldwater (April 26), Minster (April 28) and New Bremen (May 5). It has road conference games against St. Henry (April 21) and Versailles (May 3).

Key non-conference games include Celina (April 4), Jay County (April 14) and Wapakoneta (April 18).

Thien said one key to the season will be keeping the girls focused every day.

"Battling the conditions outside, not letting anything like the weather (affect) keeping their focus," he said. "It's a short season but it's every day, so keeping their focus and keeping them on task with playing fundamental defense and having quality at bats."

Cale Rammel is in line to make his varsity debut in left field, while Riggs Tobe will be moving to right field from behind the plate.

Between Dues and Wendel in the infield will be Alex Dues at shortstop and Landon Post at second. Eyink said Thien can rotate with Wendel at first base.

"Alex Dues and Troy Homan, to me they're two of our most important spots," Eyink said. "They'll also pitch a lot. I look for them to have good years."

The Indians hit just .235 as a team last year and Eyink said he sees that as the biggest challenge for this group.

"We've just struggled putting the ball in play," he said. "Somehow we've got to find a fix to that or learn to manufacture with steals and bunts."

Fort Recovery opens Midwest Athletic Conference play at home April 7 against Delphos St. Johns. It also hosts MAC rivals New Knoxville (April 14), St. Henry (April 21) and Versailles (May 3). The In-

dians have road MAC games against Parkway (April 12), Marion Local (April 19), Coldwater (April 26), Minster (April 28) and New Bremen (May 5).


