Patriots hoping to keep up power surge

The Patriots had a power surge last season, blasting 35 home runs.

But more than half of them were lost to gradua-

Trisha Green is hopeful a trio of freshmen can help continue the recent trend of being able to trot around the bases rather frequently.

"I think they're going to have a big year offensively," Green, Jay County High School's second-year softball coach, said of her team. "They've put in a lot of work. They've put in a lot of core work in the offseason."

The Patriots lost Rielev Brewster's 12 home runs to graduation as well as three each from Aubrev Schwieterman and Haley Gillette. The former two also held down the left side of the infield.

But Green will be looking to freshmen Mallory Winner, Jozey Shimp and Jaelynn Lykins as pieces to make up for what graduated.

"We have three power freshmen coming in and I think it's going to be a big year for the home run, hopefully."

Renna Schwieterman, who batted .415 with eight home runs as a sophomore, will move from first base to shortstop this year, with senior Olivia Bright (.438 AVG) sliding from second to third base. Green said Winner, who is also a strong pitcher, will play second with Shimp at first.

Lykins will be behind the plate as catcher to fill the hole from the graduation of Maddy Rinker.

Mady Fraley, who belted five home runs last year as a freshman, returns as the team's center fielder.

"She's a solid allaround player," Green said of the short, yet

speedy Fraley. "She's so fun to watch. I think she surprises everybody when she hits it over the fence."

Green said junior Janae Jacobs will be in left field, while a rotation of Mattie Ardizzone. Abbie Fields and Riah Champ will handle right field duties. She said Champ could also slide in at second base along with senior Tricia Ison, who spent most of her junior season at the iunior varsity level.

The Patriots, who were 17-8 last year and lost 8-0 to top-ranked Yorktown in the Class 3A sectional tournament, return all but nine of the 156 2/3 innings their pitchers totaled a year ago.

Haleigh Clayton handled most of the work, compiling a 2.94 ERA with 76 strikeouts and 22 walks in 121 1/3 innings. The Lincoln Trail Community College signee

posted an 11-5 record in 20 appearances with 19 starts.

"I'm expecting a big year for her pitching," Green said. "She's very accurate. She never makes me nervous. She's very consistent. She stays focused the whole game.

"She's very easy to coach (and) has a great attitude. She's been working pretty hard in the offseason. I think she's throwing harder than she was last year."

Junior Taylor Brown tossed 26 1/3 innings last vear, striking out eight and walking two with a 3.46 ERA. Having Brown returning as well as Winner's ability to pitch gives Green the ability to rest Clayton if needed.

Jay County finished in a three-way tie with Woodlan and Adams Central for the Allen County Athletic Conference championship in 2021. Woodlan handed Jay County a 4-3 setback for its only blemish against ACAC rivals.

Green is hopeful the Patriots can win it outright this year.

"I think we have a great team," she said. "I'm a little biased, but these girls work hard. They all have great attitudes. They're putting the work in. I hope we're going to win conference this year; no threeway tie."

Jay County can avenge that loss to Woodlan when it opens ACAC play at home April 21. The Patriots also host conference rivals South Adams (May 3) and Southern Wells (May 10) while traveling for road ACAC contests against Adams Central (April 28), Bluffton (May 5) and Heritage (May 12).

Throwing group leads girls track

After having the previous season canceled because of the coronavirus pandemic. Jav County High School's girls track team returned with some special tournament performances in 2021.

Last season marked the first time in school history that the program sent two athletes to the state finals.

If there is tournament magic to be had again, it will have to come from different athletes.

The Patriots' roster this year is without both state qualifiers Elisa Parazzi, who returned to Italy the day after earning a medal with a seventh-place finish in the high jump, and 2021 graduate Kinsey Shannon. Also lost to graduation is Abby Benter, who placed fifth in the regional in the 100meter hurdles. (The top three regional athletes in each event advance to the state finals.)

As Jay County looks to make an impact on the state tournament series again this season, it looks as if the strength is in its throwing duo of senior Kylie Klopfenstein and junior Gabi Bilbrey.

"Both have thrown over 35 feet in the shot put on the indoor season," said JCHS

coach Joe Imel. "Here in prac- regional in the shot put, where also coming off of a cross tice. Gabi has been consistent over 110 in the discus. ...

"So we're looking for good things for them."

Both earned sectional runner-up finishes last season. with Klopfenstein posting a distance of 36 feet, 5 inches, in the shot put and Bilbrey reaching 100 feet, 3.5 inches in the discus.

Bilbrey is the top returning individual regional athlete for the Patriots after placing seventh in the discus at 102 feet, 1 inch. (The third-place finisher was at 121 feet, 4 inches.)

Funkhouser. The sprinter scored a dozen of the Jay County High School boys track team's 34 points in last year's sectional meet at Muncie Central by himself. He did it with a run-

ner-up finish in the 400meter dash — he will be the top returning athlete in that event as 2021 champion Cole Whitehead of Yorktown has graduated — and a fifthplace finish in the 200 dash.

Funkhouser is the Patriots' only returning regional qualifier — the top three finishers in each event at the sectional advance to the next level — having placed eighth in the 400 dash at Lawrence Central last season.

"Aaron's just a phenomenal kid, a great athlete," said Imel. "He's getting pulled every which way ... because he's involved in so many things. But he still has a good attitude. He's just a phenomenal athlete.

"I'm trying to do more of a rotation so we're not beating him to death on 400s every Tuesday/Thursday, Tuesday/Thursday." Ine sprint rotation will also include Dylan Knapschafer and Christian Marentes, and Imel said he expects the 4x400 relay group to be one of the fastest for JCHS in the last quarter-century.

Knapschafer, a senior, will also be involved in the jumps as he and Isaac Kunkler were the only JCHS individuals other than Funkhouser to score points at the 2021 sectional meet, where the Patriots finished fifth as a team.

"We're hoping to get him in the 20-foot range by the end of the season," said Imel of Knapschafer in the long jump, where he is coming off of a seventh-place sectional

The sprint rotation will finish with a leap of 18 so include Dylan feet, 6.75 inches.

Kunkler cleared the bar at 5 feet, 6 inches, in the high jump for eighth in the sectional last season.

A junior, Kunkler is also slated to run middle distance for the Patriots this season after placing fifth in the 110 hurdles in the sectional a year ago.

Meanwhile, freshman Adam Alig is trying his hand at the hurdles.

"He's one of those guys where he's the best freshman shot putter, he's the best freshman high jumper, he's the best freshman sprinter," said Imel. "He's one of those kids who's just a really good athlete and you can put him in different places."

Holly Hemmelgarn, Lily Hedges and Kristen Blunk all returning to the fold, though some will be in different places.

"We've got seven sen-

iors. They're a really, really good nucleus," said JCHS coach Dave Cramer.
"They're going to be tough to replace next year.

"They're all really hard

working. They're getting better and better and better.

"It's amazing how hard they're hitting the ball. That helps a lot. They've spent a lot of time in the weight room ... and that makes a big difference. They're a lot stronger."

Leading that strong senior core on the singles side is Brewster.

After playing junior varsity during her freshman season in 2019, Brewster emerged as the top singles player last season. (The 2020 campaign was canceled because of the coronavirus pandemic.) In her first varsity match, she cruised past Sissy McNeal of Blackford 6-2, 6-4 at No. 1 singles. She added wins against Bluffton, Winchester, Union City, Richmond,

Muncie Central and Randolph Southern.

And then she knocked off Kaylan McIntire of defending champion Winchester again in the sectional semifinal, putting the Patriots up 2-1. That allowed the No. 2 doubles duo of Hemmelgarn and Hedges to secure a spot for the team in the sectional finals when they finished their 6-3, 7-5 win.

"Grace is just an amazing girl. She's just so natural," Cramer said. "She just understands the game so well. ... She knows how to place the ball. She has power. She'll be a tough, tough match for everybody."

Like Brewster, Rachel Muhlenkamp and Dirksen had a strong start to their varsity careers last season when they beat Blackford's Alli Clamme and Ammee Uggen 6-0, 6-0 at No. 1 doubles en route to opening with three straight victories. After a hiccup in the sectional semifinal, they rolled to a 6-2, 6-3 win to help the Patriots to their sectional title.

Dirksen and Muhlenkamp also earned Jay County's only win (6-3, 6-4) in their 4-1 regional loss to host Marion.

Last season's No. 2 doubles pairing of Hedges and Hemmelgarn was perfect in the sectional, fighting off a Winchester duo in the semifinal round before rolling over Union City 6-0, 6-0 in the championship match.

This year, Cramer is planning on pairing Dirksen and Hemmelgarn at the No. 1 spot.

Baseball returns nearly entire squad

The Patriots lost their best hitter. The top pitcher graduated, too.

But just about everyone else is back, and Jay County High School baseball coach Lea Selvey has his eyes on a couple players who can immediately replace Blake Caldwell and Austin Curts.

"So far we have really been pleased with the effort that we're getting from the kids," said Selvey, whose team was 13-11 last season and ended with a 6-4, no-hit loss to Guerin Catholic in the sectional opener. "We think we're further along right now than we were last year at this time."

Caldwell, who now plays for Wabash College, led the team with his .408 batting average and three home runs. He was third in RBIs (17), fifth in runs (10) and fifth in walks (seven).

Selvey said senior Crosby Heniser will move from the outfield to first base, and sophomore Ryne Goldsworthy will be at first when Heniser is on the mound.

Heniser, a left who committed to play baseball for Manchester University, threw 27 2/3 innings last year. He was 2-4 with one save in nine appearances, including six starts. He had a 4.80 ERA with 36 strikeouts and 26 walks. At the plate, Heniser had a .355 average — second on the team — with a team-high 19 RBIs, 18 runs, one double, one triple and one home run.

Sam Dunlavy, a senior, returns with the most pitching experience, having gone 2-1 in 30 2/3 innings. He ended with a 3.20 ERA with 35 strikeouts and 10 walks. Also back as pitcher is Dusty Pearson (2.89 ERA, 30

strikeouts and nine walks in 26 2/3 innings).

Sam Myers threw just 1 2/3 innings, but Selvey said he will complete a four-man rotation on the mound, noting sophomore Bryce Wenk and freshman A.J. Myers could also see some innings.

Senior Quinn Faulkner, who will join Heniser at Manchester and also play football for the Spartans, will anchor the infield at shortstop, and Selvey will rely on his experience to be the leader for the team.

"If he just plays and becomes the leader like he should be at this point, that would be big," he said. Faulkner batted .351 with a team-high 19 runs to go with 13 RBIs, two doubles, one triple and one home run. Faulkner and Heniser shared the team high of 13 walks.

Sophomore Parker

Nichols will reprise his role as Faulkner's double-play mate. Myers, also a sophomore, will be to Faulkner's other side at third.

Selvey has seniors Kess McBride and Gavin Myers will return in a two-man rotation behind the plate. The outfield consists of junior Josh Dowlen in center, Dunlavy in left and Pearson in right.

Selvey is hoping with a full year of varsity experience under their belts, the Patriots who return will have a better record than they did a year ago.

"Some of those guys, their first year was last year," Selvey said, referencing the 2020 season that was lost to the coronavirus pandemic. "They should be able to do some damage.

Jackson Edwards, Cody Rowles, Christian Runkle and Japanese exchange student Masahiro Matsuishi will also see some time as utility players.

Jay County, which opens its season Thursday at Elwood, hosts three doubleheaders this season. It entertains Centerville (April 16), Hagerstown (May 7) and Fort Wayne South Side (May 14).

The Patriots, who were 4-2 in Allen County Athletic Conference play last year to finish tied for second with Adams Central, open league play at home April 21 against Woodlan. They also host defending conference champion South Adams (May 3) and Southern Wells (May 10). Jay County hits the road to meet ACAC rivals Adams Central (April 28), Bluffton (May 5) and Heritage (May 12).

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Senior, sophomore lead boys golfers

Caleb DeRome made
history as a freshman.

He, along with then-senior and now Hanover College freshman Griffin Mann, qualified for regional.

It was the first time since 2014 the Patriots had individuals make it past sectional.

Following Mann's departure, DeRome is now the top player for the Jay County High School boys golf team while senior Kyle Sanders brings more experience to a Patriot team that lost two of its sectional golfers from last season.

DeHoff made his impact to the Patriots almost immediately as a freshman, often battling Mann for the team's low score each match.

He was third overall in the Allen County Athletic Conference tournament with his round of 85 to earn first team All-ACAC.

(The Patriots were runners-up to Heritage by two strokes.)

A week later at sectional, DeRome shot 87, and he was three strokes better at regional.

Sanders was second team All-ACAC as he shot 94 to place 13th, and at sectional he lowered his score by five strokes.

As a sophomore, Brock DeHoff competed in both the ACAC tournament (98 – 18th overall) and sectional (104), the latter of which did not factor into the Patriots' fourthplace score of 349.

That leaves secondyear coach Dave Haines needing to fill two spots on his varsity roster.

(Haines could not be reached for comment regarding this story.)

Haines has three other golfers who return for an-

other year. Senior Matt Hall spent most of his junior season on the junior varsity level. He, along with sophomores Liam Garringer and Gage Sims, have a year of high school golf under their belts.

Also vying for varsity playing time will be Griffin Byrum, Austin Dirksen, Isaac Holman and Luke Fugiett.

Jay County opens its season at the Yorktown Invitational on April 9, and travels to Richmond two days later. The Patriots then have three consecutive home matches at Portland Golf Club against Wapahani (April 14), Delta (April 18) and a three-way match with Allen County Athletic

Last season, Jay County placed 13th in the Yorktown Invitational by scoring 374. The Patriots were third (364) in the South Adams Invitational and fourth (352) in the Winchester Invitational.
