Bledsoe drowned in pond **Tuesday**

13-year-old was trying to retrieve fishing lure

A Jay County teen died Tuesday night, drowning in a rural Pennville pond.

Daryll Bledsoe Jr., 13, drowned after he waded into the pond at 5670 N. 650 West to retrieve a fishing lure that was stuck.

personnel Emergency responded to a call 8:45 p.m. Tuesday regarding a drowning victim. Bledsoe had been fishing in a neighbor's pond at 5670 N. 650 West with 12-year-old cousin Patrick O'Brien when his fishing lure became stuck. explained Jay County Sheriff Dwane Ford. He ventured into the pond to retrieve the lure and started sinking. Others at the pond attempted to help Bledsoe, but were unsuccessful and called 911.

Jacob Rutschilling of the Indiana Department of Natural Resources' District 2 Dive Team responded to the incident, pulling the boy from the pond about 9:27 p.m. (He lives about 7 miles away from the location near the Jay-Wells county line.) Bledsoe was transported to

IU Health Jay, where he was later pronounced dead. John Gano, Indiana Depart-

ment of Natural Resources District 4 public information officer and the conservation officer for Hamilton County, said authorities believe the boy's boots filled with water as he was wading into the pond, causing him to sink after a steep drop-off.

"We talk about the dangers of vimming in retention ponds said Gano. "They have steep bank drop-offs. They start off shallow and kind of go off a ledge." Jay County deputy coroner Jessica Ooten decided an autopsy was not necessary, noting several witnesses to the incident and no signs of foul play. See Drowned page 2

Bill moves to full Senate

Republican-backed bill that seeks to ban virtually all abortions in Indiana advanced to the full Senate Tuesday after adding more restrictions to the exceptions allowing rape and incest victims to access abortions.

The move came after hours of public testimony in widespread opposition to the proposal.

Senate Bill 1 now heads to the full Senate, where it could be further amended on Thursday. A vote to decide whether to send the bill to the House is expected Friday. Several senators on Tuesday expressed concerns about the language. indicating they likely won't vote for it on final passage.

"This is a bill, as we've seen, that no one can agree on all the terms of ... no one agrees that it's a perfect bill," bill author Sen. Sue Glick, R-LaGrange, said Tuesday. "However,

this is the first step in a The limit drops to eight long process ... Am I happy with the bill? Not exactly. Nor was I happy when it was drafted. This is a very difficult process, but it is a very difficult issue."

The amended bill establishes a Level 5 felony for doctors who perform any illegal abortion, meaning any abortion that falls outside the narrow scope of exceptions allowed in the proposal. The crime carries a prison term of between one and six years.

Qualifications for those exceptions also became stricter Tuesday after lawmakers adopted an amendment limiting abortions performed in cases of rape or incest to 12 weeks for those under the age of 16.

weeks for anyone aged 16 or older.

Glick said the amendment stemmed from objections that the exception for rape and incest is too vague. Senate President Pro Tempore Rodric Bray, R-Martinsville, said the time restrictions could be changed again.

"I think eight weeks is about to the heartbeat level. I think some people had concerns about going out too far, because as the baby matures, that's something that people had prob-lems with," Bray said. "But with younger kids, eight weeks didn't seem appropriate. It needed to be a little bit longer."

Portland police chief Mitch Sutton praised the community for its contributions so far toward the K-9 program, which has acquired more than half of its needed funds.

"I'm ecstatic with the turnout, with the support we got from the public," Sutton said. "In the beginning, to cough up \$18,500 out of a budget that you weren't prepared to cough up \$18,500 out of?

There are benefits to having a dog on the force. Prior to her retirement, Katja helped with 270 drug-related cases over the course of six years, according to a press release from Portland police. She conducted three searches for Jay County Jail and assisted in tracking suspects 15 times.

Seven to 10 years is the average tenure for police dogs, Sutton estimated. Assistant chief Steve Schlechty pointed out Spike's youth and said it's likely he'll be around for a longer career.

At his age, Spike is still full of puppy energy. (He loves to play ball in the water.) And, Fields said, he's ready to go at any moment.

"He does not have an off switch." joked Fields, who added that Spike is more social than his predecessor and only shows aggression when told to do so.

Continued from page 1 Republican Sen. Mark Messmer of Jasper was the only GOP lawmaker to join Democrats in voting against the amendment.

A separate approved amendment, which Glick said was requested by the Senate Republican caucus, would require the affidavit — that must be signed by a person seeking an abortion after rape or incest — be placed in a patient's permanent health record. All Democrats on the committee, plus Sen. Mike Crider, R-Greenfield, voted "no" on the change.

"I really think you have a serious question mark about unfounded allegations," Glick said. "There are proof issues if you're bringing a criminal case ... we want to make sure that everyone involved knows the significance."

Girl's case should guide abortion law

The horrific story that a 10-vear-old girl was raped and impregnated — and the political and media firestorm that followed is a sampling of what sadly will be other such spectacles splayed across the public consciousness in the wake of the United States Supreme Court decision overturning Roe v. Wade.

The fact is, before that decision, we likely would have heard nothing about this little girl's awful situation. It properly would have been the discrete personal and family medical matter it should have been – coupled with criminal charges for the rapist. Think of what this child's life has become and will be now, because of what courts and opportunistic politicians have wrought.

Again, a 10-year-old girl, a fifth-grader, was raped. And because of a new, hardline law in her home state of Ohio, she and her family had to travel to Indiana for a medically necessary abortion.

Dr. Caitlin Bernard, who performed the procedure, told The Indianapolis Star about it, and naturally, this was news. But it also soon became something else: an opportunity for far-rightwing politicians and media. First they questioned the story. Some accused Bernard of mak-model legislation he's ing the whole thing up, suggesting she was the opportunist. But when the arrest of an undocumented immigrant accused of the girl's rape validated the story, the hardliners took a new tack. Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita, whose top priority seems to be getting his mug on Fox News to mutter the word "Marxist," did just that. It didn't matter that he was talking about a little girl who had been raped. What was best for her wasn't important. This is what those who advocated against overturning Roe warned about: doing so would lead to girls and women dying. Rokita doesn't want to talk about that, and he certainly is unqualified to opine on medical matters. Yet he went on Fox News, then sent a letter to Gov. Eric Holcomb, suggesting maybe Bernard hadn't met legal reporting requirements, maybe should lose her license, etc. She soon showed she had complied with the law. Rokita? Well Bernard's attorney, Kathleen DeLaney, warned er and in cases of rape or they were "considering incest.

Inappropriate' books are essential By DAVID L. ULIN Los Angeles Times **Tribune News Service**

The house where I was raised had an open shelf rule. This meant my brother and I were allowed to read anything, no matter how inappropriate or beyond our years. We never had to ask.

I spent hours of my childhood perusing the volumes on my father's bookcases at will, trial and error. Histories, thrillers, science fiction, books on politics and culture — all of it was available to me. I keep thinking about this as more and more school districts participate in what is shaping up to look like an open war against reading. According to "Banned in the USA," a report issued by the writers' organization PEN America in April, nearly 1,600 individual books were banned in 26 states between July 1, 2021 and March 31, 2022. Among the titles challenged or removed are Ta-Nehisi Coates' "Between the World and Me," Elizabeth Acevedo's "The Poet X," Roxane Gay's "Hunger: A Memoir of (My) Body" and Robin Benway's "Far From the Tree." All are works of abiding literary merit that address issues of identity and race and family in other words, exactly the kinds of books students should be reading now. Although the challenging of books and curriculum is hardly new in the United States, what we're facing now is somewhat different. Of the current bans, PEN notes, "41% (644 individual bans) are tied to directives from state officials or elected lawmakers to investigate or remove books in schools." It is not parents or even school boards driving many of these challenges. It is the power of the state. That represents, says PEN, "an unprecedented shift.'

have been more appropriate: among them, Kurt Vonnegut and Joseph Heller, Sam Greenlee and Philip Roth.

Vonnegut taught me the universe was absurd; Heller, that authority deserved to be ridiculed. Greenlee, in his novel "The Spook Who Sat By the Door," revealed the hypocrisy of race in America. And Roth — well, perhaps the best way to explain it is to say that, in "Portnoy's Complaint," he portrayed male adolescence, which I was then experiencing, in the most visceral and outrageous terms. Writers like these represented a gateway to other authors and narratives. Vonnegut led me to Samuel Beckett, Greenlee to James Baldwin and Amiri Baraka. From Heller, I moved on to Terry Southern and William Burroughs. And "Portnoy" prepared me for the magnificent 'Fear of Flying" by Erica Jong. Reading such books as I found them helped me to reckon with the complexities and contradictions of the adult world. More important, by thinking alongside their authors, I began to think for myself. This, of course, is what the book banners object to, that readers might be influenced by ideas that legislators, parents, the neighbors down the block don't like. PEN sees the issue through the lens of the 1st Amendment, which is valid, especially given the actions of so many lawmakers and the effects on so many constituencies. But I don't want to overlook that other lens — of curiosity, self-knowledge, possibility, inquiry. Literature gives us language by which to know ourselves. But in order to do that, it has to be available. It has to remain on the shelves. Where would we be without inappropriate reading? Ask any reader and they'll tell you: We would be lost.

This is an odd definition of "pro-life."

"She would have had the baby, and as many women who have had babies as a result of rape, we would hope that she would understand the reason and ultimately the benefit of having the child," Bopp told Politico.

Indiana is preparing to potentially outlaw abortion in this state. But as this tragic case shows, abortion is a complex, personal matter that's often medically necessary. Don't most of us believe that the state should not impose its will over the right of individuals to make such personal decisions about our own lives?

Lawmakers convened Monday to weigh abortion restrictions. We have never had a clearer case demonstrating why Indiana should not ban abortion without, at the very least, providing exceptions for the health of the moth-

reinforced what many recognize from experience: Literature encourages compassion. As Jane Smiley wrote a decade ago in the New York Times: "Reading fiction is and always was practice in empathy — learning to see the world through often quite alien perspectives, learning to understand how other people's points of view reflect their experiences.

At the same time, there's more to reading than learning to be a better person. Books are not vegetables, after all. We don't read them for the same reasons we take vitamins, or eat healthy meals. Part of the joy of reading — its essential fiber, if vou will — is the way it can disturb us, disrupting our preconceptions and easy pieties. Part of what books do is to show us who we are or might become.

I know this from my open-shelf experiences. Often, the more inappropriate or beyond me a book was, the more intensely I was drawn to it. I count myself lucky that I was surrounded by adults willing to let me find my own level — not just at home but also at school. In third grade, the school librarian, who already knew me as a precocious reader, didn't stop me from taking out "War and Peace, which I kept for a week before I returned it, unread.

It was not only the reading, in other words, that was important but also the permission to do it widely, indiscriminately. That freedom left me feeling respected, affirmed. And it led me, by my early teens, to "inappropri-


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

mond at trick three, that plan goes up in smoke. You know from the bidding, as well as the size of East's diamond, that the four is a singleton, so that if you finesse, West will win and return a diamond to put you down one. You also know that rising with the ace of diamonds will leave you with two apparently unavoidable diamond losers again down one. But after mulling this over for a while, you suddenly realize there's a

way out. You can still execute an endplay, though of an entirely different sort.

So you win the diamond with the acc, draw trump, cash the A-K of spades, ruff a spade, cross to dummy with a trump and lead the queen of clubs. When East covers the queen with the ace, you discard a diamond, deliberately losing a leads a club, won by East with the jack. East cashes the king of clubs and then shifts to the four of dia-monds. This is a disappointing development. Had East led a third club, you would have been certain to make the contract. club trick you didn't have to lose. This forces East to return a spade

or a club, on which you discard your last diamond as dummy ruffs. The club trick you didn't have to lose yields two tricks in return. After ruffing high, you would draw two rounds of trump, cash the A-K of spades, ruff a spade, play a trump to dummy's queen

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


