

They're No. 1

Jay County enters season as the top-ranked team in Class 2A with a focus on championships from sectional to state duals

Jay County is ranked No. 1 in Class 2A and No. 16 overall and has big goals when it comes to the individual state tournament and team state duals.

No. 1.

There are a lot of ways to describe how good the Patriots are expected to be this year. But that single number really says it all.

Jay County High School's boys wrestling team, which opens the season Tuesday against Centerville, was ranked No. 1 in Class 2A by IndianaMat when preseason polls were released early this month.

On one hand, that ranking is an honor.

On the other, it poses a challenge

"I know this is coach talk, but I really do feel it. I hate rankings," said JCHS coach Eric Myers. "Especially whenever something like that happens because my favorite thing to do with rankings is to say, 'Hey, look at them. We're better than them. We should be knocking them off.'

"And whenever something says you're No. 1 ... now people think they're going to knock you off. You have to have the attitude that top five. that's not going to happen.

"There's a lot of tough teams in 2A this year, and we're going to have our work cut out for us, especially with a target on our back like that. But whenever you have good wrestlers, people recognize it."

The Patriots were the runnersup in the Indiana High School Wrestling Coaches Association Class 2A state duals last season. (While wrestling is a single-class sport for the IHSAA — Jay County is ranked 16th in the state overall — the coaches association breaks it down into classes for the purposes of its state duals.)

In addition to its top ranking in the class, JCHS is the No. 2 team overall in the Fort Wayne semi-state — it is contested at Allen County War Memorial Coliseum — behind only defending champion Rochester. It finished sixth in the semi-state last season.

The Patriots have seven wrestlers ranked in the top 20 in their weight class heading into the season, including two in the top five.

FRHS grad leads Oilers

The Oilers couldn't keep up with the topranked team in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics.

But Val Muhlenkamp was at her best against the best.

Muhlenkamp, a 2020 Fort Recovery High School graduate, led the University

of Findlay women's basketball Collegiate

team in scoring Saturday in its 83-45 loss to NAIA No. 1 Grand Valley State.

Muhlenkamp shot 5-of-12 from the field to lead the Oilers (2-2) with a dozen points. (The rest of the Findlay squad hit at just 27.5%.) She also had four rebounds, one steal and one block.

She came off the bench in Friday's 62-46 victory over Davenport, totaling 10 points on 5-of-9 shooting, four rebounds and one block.

Through four games, Muhlenkamp is averaged 6.5 points to go along with 3.8 rebounds. She is 4-of-4 from the free-throw line.

Competed for the Tiffin University women's cross country team, which placed 23rd out of 33 teams Saturday in the NCAA Midwest Regional at Wisconsin-Parkside.

Will was the No. 4 runner for the Dragons as she placed 164th overall. She finished the 6K race in 25 minutes, 25.76 seconds.

Alli Vaughn FRHS – 2021

Scored in double figures for the third consecutive game as the Huntington University women's basketball team lost 74-42 Saturday to Goshen.

Vaughn was the leading scorer for the Foresters (3-5) as she shot 5-of-8 from the field and hit one 3-pointer. She also had four rebounds, one block and one assist.



He shows a lot of technique from things that he's learned from all the camps that he's went to. He's just a student of wrestling. It's fun to have a kid like that."

All of the Patriots' seven semi-state qualifiers from last season are back, with Cody Rowles, Bryce Wenk, Ethan Reiley, Daniel Moore and Taye Curtis joining Clark and Wood. All of them are state-ranked.

Rowles and Wenk are both ranked 11th, the for-Castle in the opening mer at 126 pounds and the ranked 17th at 106, with Reiley and Curtis ranked 20th at 120 and 132, respectively.

Wenk was just a few heartbeats away from a state berth last season, leading 8-3 over Trey Tobias of NorthWood in the "ticket round." But he gave up a takedown and three-point near fall in the final 10 seconds to lose by

"Bryce Wenk, he's a beast," said Myers. "He should have went to the state finals last year. He had a bad 20 seconds there. It's one that hurts everybody's heart a little bit. We're hoping that he can recover there and take that next step.'

After back-to-back six consecutive firstround tournament exits, Jay County made a big leap last season. It set a new school record with 21 wins — the previous mark of 20 was set by the 2005-06 Class 3A state matched by the 2012-13

The Patriots lost nearly game winning streak, won the Allen County Athletic Conference regular-season and tournament titles, and advanced to the sectional final.

Having beaten their championship opponent by 15 points less than a month earlier, the Patriots seemed primed to bring home the trophy for the first time in a decade. But Yorktown got hot from 3-point range and walked away with the title.

The target for Jay County is to claim the championship that escaped it last year. And with a new tournament format — there is now a one-game regional followed by a two-game semi-state — Bomholt believes even more is within reach.

"For us, I think we have enough athletic ability that there's no reason we can't look at winning the sectional and winning a regional," he said, "especially with the way it's set up this year ... I think team — put together a 10- that's what they want."

either return hands you the slam. The outcome would be exactly the same if it turned out that West originally held three clubs to the queen. 

In bridge, many general rules are utilized because they are usually successful. But all such rules have their exceptions, and if adhering to one in a particular deal seems disadvantageous, you should abandon the rule on that occasion.

East had to make an unorthodox play in today's hand to defeat three notrump. The game was duly reached, although South's notrump bid without a spade stopper was somewhat unusual. The bid was correct, however, since

double implied some spade strength, and South had the high-

card values for a voluntary bid. West led a spade, dummy following low, and the outcome now hinged on East's play to this trick. Had East mechanically played the queen, in keeping with the general rule of "third hand high," South would have made the contract. But after considering the matter fully, East played the ten, forcing South to win with the jack.

Declarer had only seven sure

tricks at this point and had to lead diamonds to try to make the con-tract. When he did, West took the ace and played the A-6 of spades. allowing East to run his spades for

a one-trick set.

East's play of the ten of spades at trick one was eminently correct. If South had A-J-x, the play of the ten or queen would make no differ-ence. If South had the ace but not the jack, the ten play would be just as effective as the queen. But if South had the jack and not the ace. only the ten play would be success-

Of course, playing the queen would have allowed East to win the first trick instead of losing it. But that was really a negligible factor. Defeating the contract was the primary consideration.
